If you are a cat living in Grant County, Indiana than chances are you are not always welcome. Cats through nature's design are very good at reproducing; one 'unspayed' female cat along with her offspring and their offspring can in 7 years theoretically produce 420,000 cats. Of course not all of these cats survive to breeding maturity which could be as young as four months old. Many will suffer a slow and agonizing death from starvation, disease, cruelty and accidents, 860,000 cats are euthanized in shelters each year. Cats that persist without human involvement have a life expectancy of two years.

Cats like all of us want a chance to live another day. Most cats do not have that opportunity and their life cycle is nothing other than a struggle to survive. The public's perception of free roaming (unowned) cats is reprehensible, they want the cats gone, they take no responsibility for the conditions, they lack understanding and compassion and they consider the problem to be someone else's.

There is not enough time to change neither man's attitude nor their sense of accountability but we can save lives and we can prevent cats from being born to a world that does not want them. The solution is to SPAY and NEUTER. It will take money, education, campaigns and dedication from those that understand this crisis. If you have spayed one cat you can take solace in knowing you possibly prevented 420,000 cats from suffering.

There are individuals, organizations and veterinary clinics stepping up to make a difference and save lives and with continued help Grant County will become a No kill Community.
